Paul and his companions continued on their travels and eventually came to Troas. In Troas, Paul had a night vision from the Lord in which he saw a man standing and pleading with him.

It was a big step for him to take, to enter a new continent with the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Maybe this is why God spoke to Paul about it in such a special way. Paul came to Philippi. He went to a place at the riverside, where some women were meeting for prayer. Paul and his friends sat down and spoke with them.

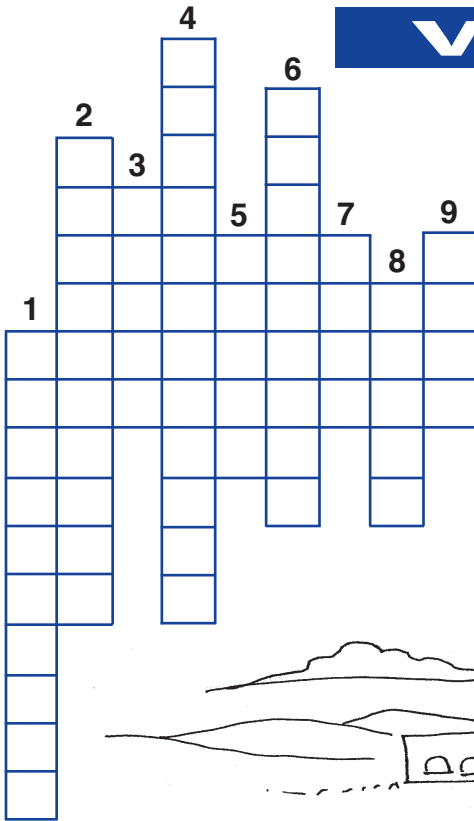

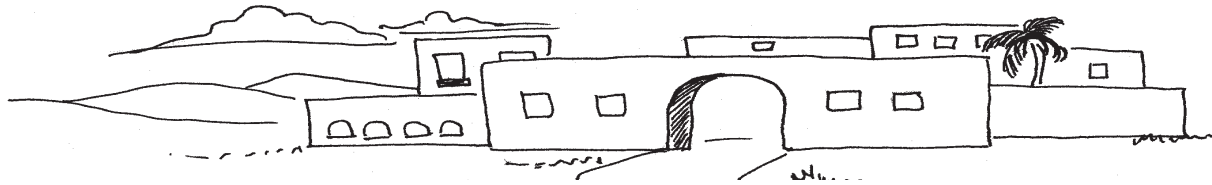

From their reading of the Old Testament, the Jews must have been expecting the Messiah, (the Christ). However, the idea of a Messiah who would die was strange to them. Paul used the Old Testament to prove that this had to be so, and he went on to show that Jesus had fulfilled all that had been written about the suffering Messiah.

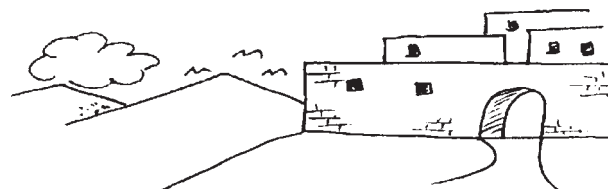
Therefore, Jesus was indeed the Christ, or Messiah. Some accepted the truth of this, and became Christians.

A short time later, Paul wrote a letter to these new Christians. We call it '1st Thessalonians'.

Having established a church in Thessalonica, Paul had to leave the city rather hurriedly. As usual, the unbelieving Jews stirred up trouble, the reason being that they were jealous.

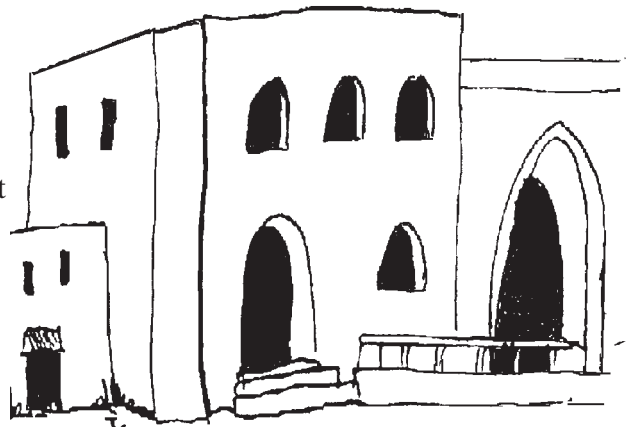

Since Paul was not present, the rulers were limited in what they could do. They let Jason and the rest out on bail, on the understanding that the bail money would be given back to them if there was no more trouble in the city.

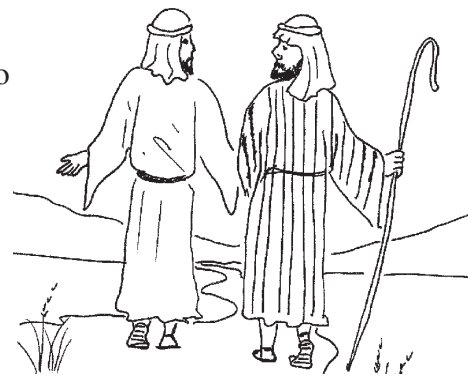
Paul left Thessalonica and pushed on further into Macedonia, coming to the town of Berea.

If we search the Scriptures desiring to know the truth, then we will find the Truth - the Lord Jesus Christ Himself - and true faith will follow.

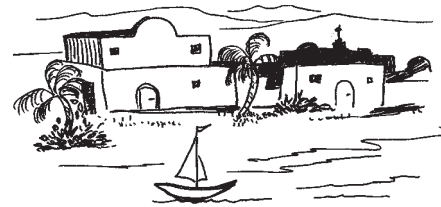

Ephesus was a city dominated by the worship of the goddess Diana (Artemis). The temples dedicated to her were full of vice and corruption. The apostle Paul had visited this city at the end of his second missionary journey. Now, some time later, he returned as he had promised he would, if it was God’s will. (See Acts 18: 19-21.)

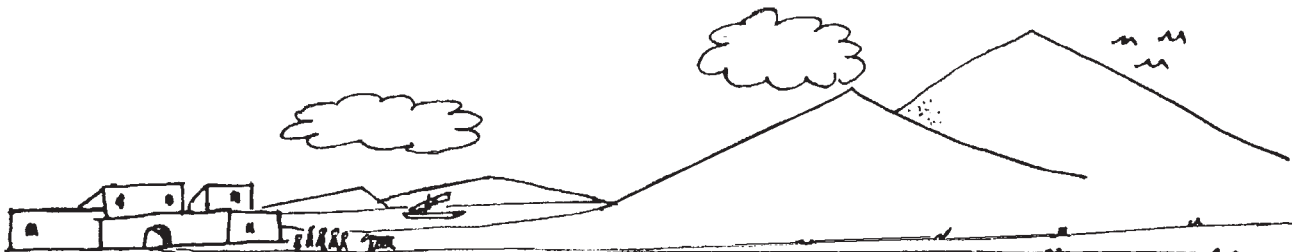

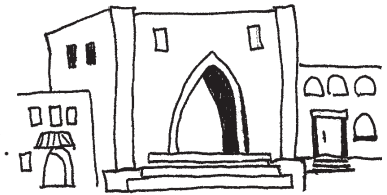

Ephesians chapter 2 is worth studying, if you want to be sure about salvation. Because the Ephesian Christians were sinners like us, they are described in the early verses (vs. 1-3) as being dead as far as God is concerned. However, by faith in the Lord Jesus they were made alive and brought into the blessings of salvation. Paul said that good works cannot save, but faith in Christ can. (vs. 8 & 9) Good works are then a proof of salvation. (See v. 10.)
